CATHERINE MCGINNIS EMBASSY HALL REGION 2 VOLUNTEER RECIPIENT

Catherine McGinnis has been a volunteer at Embassy Hall since we opened 9 years ago. Catherine is a volunteer who goes above and beyond for all our residents here. She is the first to go into the rooms and introduce herself to our newest residents, welcoming them to our facility and easing their anxiety. When there is an outing, she is our extra set of hands and eyes, who is always eager to go along with us. When our residents become palliative, Catherine sits with them, prays with them and comforts the family along this sad journey.

Every week, Catherine shows up and helps to gather our residents for bingo. She attends our bingo sessions and sits with 3 or 4 others to oversee their cards, helping them to identify the called numbers, she helps them to use their fine motor skills passing them their own chips to be placed on their cards and encouraging them to always play along.

Many times, a week we have music and once the music begins, it isn't long before we see Catherine dancing with our residents, or even just holding their hands and swinging their arms to the beat if they are in a wheelchair. Church services are every Tuesday afternoon and no matter what the denomination of religion, Catherine attends and helps us to assist the residents. She is a pleasure to have around and help us with our residents. In our eyes and the eyes of our residents she is very deserving of this award.







JOHN LARSEN VICTORIA GLEN MANOR REGION 3 VOLUNTEER RECIPIENT

John Larsen has been an active member of the Village of Perth-Andover for many years. John moved from New Denmark to Perth-Andover in 1971. In 1978, he married Beth Inman, and they have resided in Perth-Andover ever since.

John was a teacher for 25 years at the middle school in the community, where he later became principal, and eventually worked for the School Board in the District Office.

John has been a volunteer at Victoria Glen Manor for 10 years, in several capacities. John meets with residents weekly to read the two local newspapers and lead a conversation about current events. His belief is that the residents are still part of the community and it is important to stay connected in whatever way possible with what has been familiar to them for many years. The group has even taken to predicting what juicy news will be in next week's paper!

John has a bus license; he transports up to 16 Residents on shopping trips to Grand Falls, or on fall tours of the Saint John River Valley, including areas where the residents previously resides, like Tilley and Lake Edward. The fall leaf tours are the most popular, when the residents enjoy the beauty of the season.





In addition to volunteering at the Manor, John has been a member of the Rotary sine the 1980's, a member of the Elks Lodge for 40 years and drives the Perth-Andover bus which transports teenagers to events. Until 2006, John was a coordinator and coach for the local Junior Curling program and played an instrumental role in the Recreation Commission Committee which supported local hockey. John is currently a volunteer with the River Valley Thunder Senior Hockey Team as the home game manager, where he coordinates security, announcers, and the 50-50 fundraiser draw.

John has dedicated his life to others, which is apparent from his career choices to his volunteer activities. Perth-Andover is blessed to have a role model like John in the community.

For many years, Alden Appleby gave generously in service to our nursing home. He was a board member for 17 years, serving as President for 15 of those years. He also served as a member on the Board of Directors for NBANH.



He led with passion, inspired by our Vision of "a community that supports and cares about aging and vulnerable adults at every stage of their journey". While he was committed to our mission of providing excellent care and service to our residents, early on he recognized the need to replace the nursing home facility that was outdated and badly in need of major repairs. From then on, he worked tirelessly with the board and management team to secure the approval and funding for a new facility. He oversaw the many challenges that resulted in the realization of the dream of our new facility, Villa Renaissance.

Along with his commitment to the residents of the villa, he firmly believes that the expertise found in nursing homes should extend beyond the walls of the building and be made available to those in the broader community. He has encouraged the management team as they explore options for developing outreach projects to promote aging in place.



He was supportive of the Dalhousie Nursing Home Foundation which was established during his term as president.

Alden always took time from his busy schedule to attend meetings whether they were scheduled or called on short notice. He never objected to travelling for meetings with the nursing home network, government officials or Ministers, always advocating for the aging and vulnerable people we serve.

He participated in special activities for the residents and other events such as employee and volunteer recognition celebrations. He has a great sense of humour which can lighten tensions and ease discussions. Once business is taken care of, he enjoys socializing and is a gifted story teller with many stories to share. He can be the life of a party with his musical skills.

His decision to relocate from Dalhousie has been a loss to our villa family since we have no doubt that he would continue to be a dedicated and influential force in our home and community for years to come. There are no words to adequately express our gratitude for all he has done.





RITA LABRIE VILLA BEAUSÉJOUR INC. REGION 6 VOLUNTEER RECIPIENT

Ms. Rita Labrie is a nurse by training. She received a degree from the Bathurst School of Nursing in 1969. She also completed a Bachelor of Nursing and a Master of Administration at Moncton University. She pursued a career in health in the Kedgwick/Saint-Quentin area, later ending up at Fredericton's Department of Health in 2002.

Rita's move to Caraquet in 2005 did nothing to slow down her volunteer work. She has been involved with Dames d'Acadie, the parish choir, the parish management committee, the hospital auxiliary shop, Sainte-Anne-du-Bocage Sanctuary, the hospital advisory committee, and other activities in the province.

Since 2005, Rita has spent many hours volunteering. She started by volunteering as a chorister during the parish's church services. She then facilitated sensory stimulation sessions with music for residents with dementia. 
